#### SUBCOMMITTEE REPORTS:

- Jan reported that the house recently approved for demolition at 805 Washington Street has come down and the cellar has been filled.
- Alan brought up the plans for the St. Mary's property and although we were told there were no plans yet, Alan believes there are in fact plans and drawings.
- A Legacy Tree application has been submitted for the old oak tree at the corner of Main and Pleasant. There are pictures of the tree when it was part of the Hayward Gardens dating back over 100 years.
- Paul asked is there any way to stall decisions for future demolition requests if the petitioner only has a plan to demolish but no plan to build.
- Mary said she had spoken with Director of Humanities Tim Frazier; Assistant Superintendent of Teaching and Learning Tina Rogers and Admin Denise Miller with the Franklin School Administration regarding setting up a program for 3<sup>rd</sup> graders to visit the museum as part of their curriculum. They liked the idea and want to work with us. More to follow.

## Exhibit Subcommittee Report

Report for April 12, 2023

### I. The Powerful Pipes and Resonant Reeds – An appreciation of the historic organs of Franklin

For centuries, pipe organs were arguably the most complex machines devised by humans. In the 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century, Franklin institutions – churches and Dean Academy – acquired a number of representative instruments that were a point of pride for town. Less wealthy institutions, such as the Old South Congregational, made do with lovely “Reed Organs” like that still in the possession of the museum. The proposed Exhibit could include:

- The museum’s reed organ
- An event, perhaps a Sunday afternoon ‘stroll’ to encompass brief concerts at each of the existing reed and pipe organs .... Or this could be a concert series sponsored by the Museum and the respective congregations. [By chance, I met with Rev. Juncker ‘across the lot’ and he is interested and said he had been looking for an opportunity to showcase their organ]
- Slide show about organs and how they work and what makes them significant

### II. Old Time Radio and Old Time Radios.

We have, I think, about 3 pre 1930 (I think) radios from the battery era that we have never made a fuss over. And it isn't very much to build an exhibit around but in our brainstorming, I recalled that Pete Fasciano at FranklinTV/Radio has a nice collection of gear that he might be willing to loan. In addition, there might also be possible "interactive" things that could give this some liveliness and longevity such as:

- Showing of the made-for-TV movie, The Night That Panicked America or some similar thing about the Orson Welles martian landing radio drama of 1938
- Have some amateurs put on a radio drama with WFPR at the Museum. If we were really ambitious (I am not) a series, in the best of all possible worlds it could be adapted to Franklin characters, historic or present day.
- Arrange a field trip for townspeople to the broadcasting museum in Woonsocket
- Convince a scout troop to come build crystal radio kits with some help from old timer
- A lecture on the history of radio in the region (Donna Halper, maybe?)

### III. Trowbridge Pianos

This could include 'our' piano (perhaps with a concert, though I think it needs tuning or repair), a slide show or film about how pianos are made, what a big deal they were until mid 20<sup>th</sup> century, how Boston became a huge center of manufacture, and as much as we can find about Trowbridge...

### IV. For those under 40, TYPEWRITERS

- \* Have some battered typewriters that people can play with
- \* Revisit the terrors of typing class
- \* Office Culture pre word=processing (and let's not forget mike nesmith's mom inventing whiteout!)

### V. Dial me! Revisiting the dial telephone.
