FRANKLIN TOWN COUNCIL MINUTES OF MEETING February 14, 2018

A meeting of the Town Council was held on Wednesday, February 14, 2018, at the Franklin Municipal Building, 355 East Central Street, Franklin, Massachusetts. Councilors present: Patrick Casey, Robert Dellorco, Melanie Hamblen, Glenn Jones, Eamon McCarthy Earls, Thomas Mercer, Peter Padula, Deborah Pellegri. Councilors absent: Matthew Kelly. Administrative personnel in attendance: Jeffrey Nutting, Town Administrator; Jamie Hellen, Deputy Town Administrator; Mark Cerel, Town Attorney.

CALL TO ORDER: ► Vice Chairman Mercer called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM with a moment of silence and the Pledge of Allegiance.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: January 10, 2018, January 24, 2018. ► MOTION to Approve the January 10, 2018 meeting minutes by Padula. SECOND by Dellorco. No Discussion. ► VOTE: Yes-8, No-0, Absent-1. ► MOTION to Approve the January 24, 2018 meeting minutes by Padula. SECOND by Dellorco. No Discussion. ► VOTE: Yes-8, No-0, Absent-1.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Vice Chairman Mercer announced the meeting is being recorded by *Franklin TV* and available for viewing on Comcast Channel 11 and Verizon Channel 29. This meeting may also be recorded by others.

CITIZEN COMMENTS: None.

APPOINTMENTS: ► *Agricultural Commission.* ► Vice Chairman Mercer stated that the administration has asked that this item be postponed until the next meeting as a little more work on this needed to be done.

Design Review Commission. ►Mr. Jones read the appointment. ► MOTION to Ratify the appointment by the Town Administrator of Sean Preston to serve as an associate member of the Design Review Commission with an expiration of June 31, 2019 by Jones. SECOND by Padula. Discussion: ►Mr. Preston introduced himself and provided his background. ►VOTE: Yes-8, No-0, Absent-1.

HEARINGS: None.

LICENSE TRANSACTIONS: None.

PRESENTATIONS/DISCUSSIONS: None.

SUBCOMMITTEE REPORTS:

- 1. Capital. ► Mr. Dellorco stated they had their final meeting two weeks ago; they did DPW and Public Safety. Everything went well. He thanked his fellow councilors, Mr. Nutting, and Mr. Hellen for their help in making it a smooth process.
- 2. **Budget.** ► Mr. Padula stated the subcommittee will be meeting next Tuesday.
- 3. *Economic Development.* ► Mr. Mercer stated they met on January 29, 2018. They started to look at some of the many items that need to be addressed. One of the first things to be worked on is updating some zoning lines that need a little tweaking. The next meeting is next Wednesday.

LEGISLATION FOR ACTION:

- Resolution 18-04: Appropriation Street Lighting (Motion to Move Resolution 18-04 Majority Vote (5)). ► Mr. Jones read the resolution. ► MOTION to Move Resolution 18-04: Appropriation Street Lighting for \$22,500 by Jones. SECOND by Padula. Discussion: ► Mr. Nutting stated this is to repair and replace bulbs that get burned out and to replace underground wire. Expenses have gone up. This is for the old existing lights. Once the LEDs are installed, the expensive budget for this cost will go down significantly because the LEDs have a 10-year life. ► Mr. Hellen noted that the updating of the street lighting is going through a pilot program with a few streets in town to test different lights. ► VOTE: Yes-8, No-0, Absent-1.
- 2. Resolution 18-05: Appropriation General Fund Capital FY 18 (Motion to Move Resolution 18-05 Majority Vote (5)). ► MOTION to Waive the reading by Dellorco. No SECOND. ► Mr. Jones read the resolution. ► MOTION to Move Resolution 18-05 Appropriation General Fund Capital FY 18 for \$1,866,500 by Dellorco. SECOND by Padula. Discussion: ► Town Council members asked questions and discussed the item. ► Mr. Nutting stated this gets funded out of Free Cash. With this vote and the vote just taken on the lights, there will still be about \$727,000 left in Free Cash. We do all the capital out of Free Cash, so it really will not affect the FY 19 operating budget. He noted that Mr. Dellorco headed the committee and a vote of 4-0 was taken to recommend this plan. ► Police Chief Lynch explained the live fingerprint scanning system. ► School Superintendent Ahern stated that the current math materials are 10 years out of date for middle school and early high school. ► VOTE: Yes-8, No-0, Absent-1.
- 3. Resolution 18-06: Appropriation Fire Truck Stabilization Fund FY 18 (Motion to Move Resolution 18-06 Majority Vote (5)). ►Mr. Jones read the resolution. ►MOTION to Move Resolution 18-06: Appropriation Fire Truck Stabilization Fund FY 18 for \$100,000 by Jones. SECOND by Padula. Discussion: ►Mr. Nutting stated the town tries to buy a new fire engine about every seven years; the way it is done is to save for seven years. This is good fiscal planning. The same is true for the next item. ►VOTE: Yes-8, No-0, Absent-1.
- 4. Resolution 18-07: Appropriation Turf Field Stabilization Fund FY 18 (Motion to Move Resolution 18-07 Majority Vote (5)). ► Mr. Jones read the resolution. ► MOTION to Move Resolution 18-07: Appropriation Turf Field Stabilization Fund FY 18 for \$150,000 by Jones. SECOND by Padula. Discussion: ► Mr. Nutting stated this is the same plan as the above item. ► VOTE: Yes-8, No-0, Absent-1.
- 5. Resolution 18-08: Appropriation Enterprise Fund Capital FY 18 (Motion to Move Resolution 18-08 Majority Vote (5)). ► Mr. Jones read the resolution. ► MOTION to Move Resolution 18-08: Appropriation Enterprise Fund Capital FY 18 for \$405,000 by Jones. SECOND by Dellorco. No Discussion. ► VOTE: Yes-8, No-0, Absent-1.
- 6. Resolution 18-09: Appropriation OPEB Trust Fund FY 18 (Motion to Move Resolution 18-09 Majority Vote (5)). ► Mr. Jones read the resolution. ► MOTION to Move Resolution 18-09: Appropriation OPEB Trust Fund FY 18 for \$280,000 by Jones. SECOND by Dellorco. Discussion: Mr. Nutting provided an update on where the town is with OPEB. He stated there is a \$69-\$70 million obligation; there is about \$3.5 in the bank. The policy is to put 10 percent Free Cash and increase the annual appropriation in the budget by \$50,000 per year. He noted the annual meeting of the OPEB Trust is in March. ► VOTE: Yes-8, No-0, Absent-1.
- 7. Resolution 18-10: Dissolution of the Senior Center Building Committee (Motion to Move Resolution 18-10 Majority Vote (5)). ►Mr. Jones read the resolution. ►MOTION to Move Resolution 18-10: Dissolution of the Senior Center Building Committee by Jones. SECOND by

- **Dellorco. Discussion:** ► Vice Chairman Mercer stated that having been the Chairman of the Senior Center Building Committee, he thanked the committee members and the director of facilities. As well, he thanked the architectural firm and the project manager for doing a wonderful job. ► Mr. Nutting thanked the committee for doing a wonderful job. He said it will serve the community for generations to come. It is one of the best senior centers in the Commonwealth. He said the remaining punch list will be completed in the next couple of months. ► Town Council members stated it has many features and is a great facility. ► **VOTE: Yes-8, No-0, Absent-1.**
- 8. Resolution 18-11: Dissolution of the Library Building Committee (Motion to Move Resolution 18-11 Majority Vote (5)). ► Mr. Jones read the resolution. ► MOTION to Move Resolution 18-11: Dissolution of the Library Building Committee by Jones. SECOND by Padula. Discussion: ► Vice Chairman Mercer thanked the Library Building Committee Chair Judy Pfeffer, the committee members, the director of facilities, and the construction contractor for their efforts and fantastic job on this project. ► Mr. Nutting thanked the staff for their hard work in having to move the library to the temporary space and then back to the library building. He stated work on incorporating more funds to the library is needed. Franklin is one of the libraries in the state that does meet the minimum required by statute. ► Town Council members asked questions and discussed library funding and the statute. ► VOTE: Yes-8, No-0, Absent-1.
- 9. Resolution 18-12: Dissolution of the Franklin Advisory Committee (Motion to Move Resolution 18-12 Majority Vote (5)). ► Mr. Jones read the resolution. ► MOTION to Move Resolution 18-12: Dissolution of the Franklin Advisory Committee by Jones. SECOND by Padula. Discussion: Mr. Nutting thanked the committee and said they made a couple of good recommendations; their hard work is appreciated. ► Vice Chairman Mercer thanked the committee chair and members for their work on the town's behalf. ► VOTE: Yes-8, No-0, Absent-1.
- 10. Bylaw Amendment 18-798R: Chapter 155, Streets and Sidewalks 1st Reading (Motion to Move Bylaw Amendment 18-798R to a 2nd Reading Majority Vote (5)). ► Mr. Jones read the bylaw amendment. ► MOTION to Move Bylaw Amendment 18-798R: Chapter 155, Streets and Sidewalks to a 2nd Reading by Dellorco. SECOND by Padula. Discussion: ► Mr. Nutting stated the Town Council's advice was taken and the language for this amendment was changed. ► Mr. Cerel stated that if a project is ongoing, this could hold up permits until any fine gets paid. ► Regarding how the contractor would be notified, the town official would go onsite and notify the contractor to clean up their mess. ► VOTE: Yes-8, No-0, Absent-1.
- 11. Bylaw Amendment 18-799: Chapter 82, Fees, Appendix B Sewer Rates 2nd Reading (Motion to Approve Bylaw Amendment 18-799 Majority Roll Call Vote (5)). ▶ Mr. Jones read the bylaw amendment. ▶ MOTION to Approve Bylaw Amendment 18-799: Chapter 82, Fees, Appendix B Sewer Rates by Dellorco. SECOND by Padula. Discussion: ▶ Mr. Nutting stated that a study was conducted and the average Massachusetts sewer rate is \$862 per year for someone that uses 120 cubic feet of water per year; the average Franklin amount is \$618. But, the average Franklin user only uses about 88 cubic feet; so, the average Franklin bill is \$450 per year against the state average of \$862. This increase is critical to maintain the town's infrastructure. It has been five years since the rate has increased. ▶ ROLL CALL VOTE: Casey-YES; Dellorco-YES; Hamblen-YES; Jones-YES; Earls-YES; Mercer-YES; Padula-YES; Pellegri-YES. ▶ VOTE: Yes-8, No-0, Absent-1.
- 12. Bylaw Amendment 18-800: Chapter 82, Fees, Appendix B Water Rates 2nd Reading (Motion to Approve Bylaw Amendment 18-800 Majority Roll Call Vote (5)). ► Mr. Jones read the bylaw amendment. ► MOTION to Approve Bylaw Amendment 18-800: Chapter 82, Fees, Appendix B Water Rates by Dellorco. SECOND by Padula. Discussion: ► Mr. Nutting stated the average statewide is \$595 and Franklin is \$470. The water rates have not been increased in six years. ► ROLL

CALL VOTE: Casey-YES; Dellorco-YES; Hamblen-YES; Jones-YES; Earls-YES; Mercer-YES; Padula-YES; Pellegri-YES. ►**VOTE**: **Yes-8**, **No-0**, **Absent-1**.

TOWN ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT: ►Mr. Nutting stated that they are busy with the budget, working with the school folks, crunching numbers for all department heads, and waiting for health insurance numbers to come in, probably early next week. He has a meeting next week with budget folks. Moving along with this; trying to make a long-term strategic plan because this is not a one-year problem. They will also have meetings with all the unions.

FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS: ► Ms. Hamblen stated that Ms. Stacey David, Chair of the Cultural District Council, contacted Ms. Hamblen and Mr. Earls. Ms. David stated they are concerned about the restrictions on advertising and they want to put up some temporary banners to advertise special events. ► Vice Chairman Mercer stated this would go to the EDC and it is on their agenda for their next meeting.

COUNCIL COMMENTS: ►Ms. Hamblen stated she was honored to be a guest reader at the library; the youth services librarian is fabulous. She warned people that there are already ticks out. ►Mr. Dellorco sent prayers to those in Florida regarding the shooting that happened today. ►Ms. Pellegri thanked Jeff Roy for securing Elizabeth Warren to come to Franklin; it was a wonderful day. There were over 1,600 people. ►Mr. Jones said God Bless to Florida and pray for the families and children affected by this. ►Vice Chairman Mercer gave a shout out to the Franklin High School Wrestling Team who went undefeated and for the first time in 20 years all weight classes qualified for the state championships. ►Mr. Nutting gave a shout out to the School Committee who gave a forum last night about the struggles schools have regarding funding; it was well run and informative. He noted that there are lots of hearts around the gazebo in the Town Common; a local person asked if they could do that. Anytime there is a chance for art, the town tries to say yes. It will be up for a couple of weeks.

WHEREAS, the Secretary of State has interpreted this statutory requirement to apply to the replacement of existing voting machines with new voting machines, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Franklin has been and is currently using nine (9) Accuvote voting machines, and

WHEREAS, the Franklin Town Council, as part of Resolution 18-05, the fiscal year 2018 capital budget which it approved on February 14, 2018, appropriated \$85,000 to purchase nine (9) new Imagecast Precinct Tabulator voting machines for use at all future Town-held elections,

NOW, THEREFORE, be it voted by the Franklin Town Council that the use of the existing nine (9) Accuvote voting machines at Town-held elections shall cease and the use of the nine (9) new Imagecast Precinct Tabulator voting machines shall be implemented, effective with the State Primary Election to be held on September 4, 2018 and for all subsequent Town-held elections.

This Resolution shall become effective according to the rules and regulations of the Town of Franklin Home Rule Charter.

BYLAW AMENDMENT 18-798R

CHAPTER 155, STREETS AND SIDEWALKS

A BYLAW TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF FRANKLIN AT CHAPTER 155, ARTICLE II

BE IT ENACTED BY THE FRANKLIN TOWN COUNCIL that Chapter 155, Article II of the Code of the Town of Franklin is amended by amending Article II as follows:

Article II: Snow and Ice, Leaves and Yard Waste, Soil, Gravel, or Debris, or Water Discharge in Public Way

Violations of any section or provision of this chapter shall be enforced by the Franklin Police Department or the Director of Public Works or his designee.

§ 155-21 **Deposit of snow and ice.**

No person shall plow, push, deposit, throw or pile snow or ice into or across any public street, sidewalk or property nor direct nor cause the same to be done unless in the employ of the Town.

§ 155-22 Deposit of leaves and yard waste.

No person shall rake, blow, deposit throw or pile leaves or yard waste into or across any public street, sidewalk or property nor cause the same to be done unless in the employ of the Town.

§155-23 Deposit of soil, gravel, or debris.

No person shall cause or permit any truck, or other vehicle or equipment to push, drop, track, or otherwise deposit any soil, gravel or other debris into any public roadway or onto any public roadway surface from a construction or other worksite, unless in the employ of the Town. If a prohibited deposit occurs, the person causing or otherwise responsible for it shall immediately report same to the Franklin Public Works Director and shall conduct a clean-up under the Director's supervision and to the Director's satisfaction, at no expense to the Town; if the person fails to do so, the Department of Public Works may do so and recover all costs from the person causing or otherwise responsible for the prohibited deposit. "Otherwise responsible" person shall include owner(s) and/or developer(s) of the property which the Town determines to be the source of the prohibited deposit of soil, gravel or debris.

§ 155-2324 Discharge of storm- or groundwater.

No person shall discharge or direct stormwater surface run-off or groundwater by means of a pipe, pump, trench, or other means into or across any public street, sidewalk or property nor cause the same to be done unless in the employ of the Town or prior written permission has been received from the Director of Public Works or his designee.

§ 155-2425 Violations and penalties.

A violation of § 155-21, 155-22, or 155-23 or 155-24 may be punished by a fine of up to \$300; in the case of a violation of § 155-23, each day shall constitute a separate violation. for purposes of noncriminal disposition, fines for violations shall be assessed as follows:

First Offense:	\$100
Second Offense:	\$200
Third and Subsequent Offense	e(s): \$300

Each day that any prohibited deposit remains shall be considered a separate offense. In addition, if a prohibited deposit occurs, in violation of Section 155.23, failure to report and/or clean-up as provided shall each be considered an additional and separate offense from the prohibited deposit; Town may impose a fine or fines in addition to recovering its clean-up costs.

§ 155-2526 Enforcement.

Violations of this any section contained in this Article shall be enforced by the Franklin Police Department or the Director of Public Works or his designee.

This bylaw amendment shall become effective in accordance with the provisions of the Franklin Home Rule Charter.
